

Purpose and Concept of the Conference (1)

The Kyoto Conference explores fundamental questions of value.

Conventional Problem Solving is Ineffective

- While economic growth and technological development have brought unprecedented prosperity to the world, they have also further complicated and intensified challenges such as geopolitical tensions, climate change, and the evolution of AI
- This polycrisis—interlinked, compounding challenges—cannot be solved by conventional technological or policy approaches alone

Call for Questioning Value

- To confront the roots of complex and deepening challenges, we must reexamine the very direction in which we are heading
- At the heart of such fundamental questioning lies value—what we deem important, desirable, and right
- The urgent task now is to develop a new shared understanding of value


Structure of the Challenge

- We propose to conceptualize the mechanisms driving today's challenges in terms of two dynamics:
 - Fragmentation Structural conflict among existing value systems
 - Transformation Changes to existing value systems caused by new technologies and social forces




Purpose and Concept of the Conference (2)

To navigate these complex dynamics, we propose the ABC Model.



- This framework understands social phenomena on three levels: Action (concrete practices), Core (underlying values), and Bridge (the mediating institutions and cultural forms that connect the two)
- It is designed to foster a back-and-forth movement between "diving", which deepens inquiry into the root causes of problems at the level of values, and "surfacing", which envisions the future from the perspective of new values

By combining the three-level model of values (root axis) with diverse stakeholders (plurality axis) to capture the pluralism of values, our framework expands into a two-dimensional

Purpose and Concept of the Conference (3)


The Kyoto Conference will take as its practical reference the following four agendas proposed in the White Paper.

Build a Value Co-creation Network


Form a collaborative platform for value inquiry that transcends sectors and regions

Ground Rules for Dialogue

We suggest the following five rules to make the Kyoto Conference a forum of trans-sectoral dialogue.



- We encourage a future-oriented approach that goes beyond analyzing the present and identifying problems
- We aim to collectively explore new values, new ways for society to be, and new possibilities for collaboration across disciplines

- What is common sense in one field is not necessarily self-evident in others
- To realize a rich interdisciplinary dialogue, we encourage you to avoid specialized jargon whenever possible and to speak in a deliberate and open manner that is accessible to those outside your own field of expertise

Part I

The Fundamental Questions of Value

Panel Discussion 1

The Starting Point: Values in a Multilayered World

- This session embodies the process of "Diving" deep in thought—from the visible, concrete divisions and conflicts in society (Action level), to the underlying social systems and cultures (Bridge level), and further to the fundamental values and worldviews that support them (Core level).
- From a philosophical perspective, it aims to uncover the structural factors of the problems we face.

Panel Discussion 2

Al and the Question of The Human

- This session will multifacetedly discuss how the fundamental transformative power represented by AI shakes our values.
- Crossing perspectives from technology, art, philosophy, and robotics, it will urge a redefinition of values that have hitherto been taken for granted, such as humanity, intelligence, and creativity."





Part II

Redesigning Society in the Age of Al

Venue I

Technological Transformation and the Future of the Corporation

- As the transformation of industrial structures by Al accelerates, this session explores how individual companies can translate their social purpose into concrete business activities, balancing economic and social value.
- In an era where the social role of corporations and their relationships with diverse stakeholders are being re-examined, this discussion will integrate insights from various fields, including manufacturing, information/media industries, and the social implementation of science and technology, to debate the new roles and responsibilities of corporations in the age of AI.

Venue II

Trust and Governance

- In an era where geopolitical shifts intersect with technological innovation, this session examines how to build "trust" among diverse actors—states, enterprises, and international organizations—and how to forge effective global governance.
- From multiple layers—technical standards, economic cooperation, next-generation education, and people-to-people exchange—we will, through an ethical lens, discuss new forms of leadership and rulemaking capable of bridging divides.

Venue III

Reconstructing Democracy

- In an era where AI is deeply involved in societal decision-making, the democratic foundations of the public sphere and civic deliberation are being called into question at a fundamental level.
- This session explores how decision-making should be updated for the AI age. Drawing on perspectives from philosophy and social psychology to the practice of urban governance, we will critically examine existing frameworks.
- At the same time, we will consider the possibilities of alternative decision-making processes and envision models of democracy that are more resilient and responsive.



Part III Horizons of Value Co-creation

Venue I

Human-Technology Symbiosis

- Cutting-edge technologies—led by Al—are acting as a force of "Transformation," driving dramatic change across society.
- This transformation not only raises our productivity but also shakes the very foundations of our values—"humanity," "intelligence," and "creativity"—compelling us to redefine them.
- In this session, we will confront these fundamental questions and explore how we should envision our future with technology. Going beyond the level of how to use technology, we will discuss, from diverse perspectives, which values we must uphold and which we should newly advance—in this era of transformation.

Venue II

Cultural Diversity and Universal Values

- Globalization has brought "Fragmentation"—
 the collision of differing value systems—into
 sharp relief as a defining challenge of our time.
- At the root of this fragmentation lies a creative tension between two imperatives: to honor culturally specific values and to discover shared guidelines that enable coexistence across differences
- In this session, we will confront this fundamental question and explore how we might overcome fragmentation. Rather than asking which side is correct, we will, from diverse perspectives, discuss new forms of collaboration that transform diversity into a source of strength from within this tension.

Panel Discussion 3

Industry as a Driver of Social Change

This session gathers Japan's top business leaders and experts for an in-depth Japanese-language discussion on the evolving role and future of companies amid rapidly changing societal values, against Japan's historical and cultural backdrop.

Panel Discussion 4

The Creative Leap: Value through Arts and Culture

- This session explores how we can connect fundamental values and visions to concrete forms and actions.
- It seeks to understand realities that cannot be fully grasped by logic or data alone, and to investigate the role of arts and culture as a "medium" that inspires creative leaps.

Part IV

Prospects for the Future

Panel Discussion 5

Towards a Network of Networks

- Collaboration across disciplines, cultures, and borders is essential for solving global challenges.
- In this session, leaders from diverse fields, each with their own unique networks – such as science diplomacy, international networks of humanistic knowledge, inclusive AI ethics, and advanced technology research – will gather.
- While sharing the challenges faced by individual networks, they will explore how to connect them and build an effective "network of networks" that can become a force for greater social change. They will seek common value foundations and practical approaches for this endeavor.

Panel Discussion 6 Shaping Our Global Agendas

- The conference's closing session integrates the diverse discussions of the past two days and channels them into concrete actions for the future. In a world where values have become plural, how can we shape a shared "global agenda"?
- This session will also question the very subject—the "we"—that speaks of such an agenda, and will discuss pathways for carrying the insights and connections forged here forward into a sustained movement of intellectual inquiry and practice.
